FROM THE VAULT

WILLIAM DIGBY, BY GEORGE WINTER BY KELLY LIPPIE, CURATOR OF COLLECTIONS

As we celebrate and recognize the bicentennial of the founding of the City of Lafayette, the founder William Digby is also getting a lot of attention this year. One of the most significant paintings in the collection of the Tippecanoe County Historical Association is a portrait of William Digby done by another notable Lafayette resident, George Winter. Only two portraits of Digby are known to exist (and one daguerreotype photograph); both painted by Winter. One painting, done around 1856, shows Digby sitting on a log in the forest with the Wabash River in the background. This painting is in the collection of the Tippecanoe County Public Library. A second painting, a bust portrait, was painted around 1858 and hung in Lafayette City Hall for many years. In 1931, the bust portrait was donated to TCHA for safekeeping; where it remains to this day.

In 1906, A.O. Reser collected a description from Mark Jenners, an early resident of Lafayette:

"I knew William Digby very well. He was a big man in every way. He was six feet tall and weighed 200 pounds. He never married. He lived in Lafayette with the family of W. H. Watson. He was a great man to play cards. Seven-up was his favorite game. He used to go on flat boats to New Orleans. He was captain of these boats and would play cards all the way down on the flat boats and then he would come back on steamers and play cards all the way back. He was an all 'round old fellow and was liked by all classes of people. He was inclined to be light complexioned and had light hair. I don't believe he was much of a hunter but he liked to fish. He was a regular frontier all-around man. He was always ready to fight or do

anything in support of what he believed to be right".

His obituary in the Lafayette Courier described him, "He was generous to a fault, credulous, confiding and was oftener sinned against than sinning. Whatever of human frailty there might have been that marred his early manhood, it should be all forgotten in the blameless character of his riper years."

In 1988, the painting underwent restoration to help conserve the frame and supports. Digby died in 1864, just six years after the completion of his second portrait. He was buried at Greenbush Cemetery, near his mother and sister.

The **Facilities Committee** (formerly the Buildings & Grounds Committee) is a standing committee per our bylaws that functions to oversee maintenance, major improvements or construction of TCHA properties.

Finance, Budget, and Risk Management is also a standing committee per TCHA's bylaws. This committee is responsible for the creation of Budget proposal for December meeting and oversight of spending to ensure the financial stability of our Association.

Membership and Development was created as an ad hoc committee to maintain and recruit membership for TCHA as well as support in fundraising efforts.

TCHA's Program Committee works with the Executive Director on topics, presentations or other education and engaging activities related to TCHA's mission. They are responsible for setting the quarterly program schedule that includes things like cemetery tours, lecture programs and Taste of the Past dinners.

Our **Historic Markers Committee** has been recently revitalized and oversees and manages the TCHA owned historic markers in Tippecanoe County.

Finally, our **Publications Committee** works to plan and review TCHA's publications regarding local history. Some current projects include working on a reprint of our self-published The Battle of Tippecanoe: November 7, 1811 and creating standards for reviewing current publications and other documents that TCHA owns the rights to evaluate what may fit our mission to review, revise or republish.

WHAT ARE THE LIBRARY VOLUNTEERS UP TO?


One of our volunteers has been indexing an amazing book entitled "Personal War Sketches" which was produced in 1900 by the Women's Relief Corps of the Marsh B. Taylor Post, No. 475 Grand Army of the Republic. The Women's Relief Corps of this post was instituted on November 28, 1893, the first patriotic organization of women in Tippecanoe County. The object of the order was "to assist the Grand Army of the Republic and to perpetuate the memory of their Heroic Dead; to assist such union veterans as need our help and protection, to assist widows and orphans, to find them homes and employment, assure them sympathy and friends, to maintain true allegiance to the United States, to inculcate lessons of patriotism and love of country among our children and in the community in which we live and to encourage the spread of universal liberty and equal rights to all."

This large ledger contains transcriptions of stories told by 191 Civil War soldiers who were members of the veterans' fraternal organization organized in West Lafayette in 1886. The sketches contain a wealth of information including biographical data, enlistment details, illness and hospitalization, battles, captures and prison experiences and names of their best friends. It makes for fascinating reading, and it is no wonder our volunteers are enticed into reading the soldiers' stories.

Alfred Vance described waking up on the Battlefield at Selma, Alabama the morning after the battle surrounded by dead and wounded rebels. He offered water from his canteen to a wounded rebel colonel who gave him his sword in return. Vance refused at first but ended up accepting the sword which he says is still owned by his brother Capt. [Robert] Vance. Alfred Vance died in 1911 and is buried at Hebron Cemetery in Wabash Township.

One of the longest entries is that of Albert A. Jones of Battle Ground, which spans fourteen pages. He tells his whole life story, including going to California where his father had gone during the gold rush, returning to Indiana where he helped carry bricks to build the Battle Ground Institute, a long, detailed description of his Civil War service, his career as a railroader and time as a trustee at the Veterans Home. These sketches are a goldmine of information for family history researchers as well as fascinating reading for lovers of Civil War history and local history. We have such interesting things in our collection!

In December 1868, the Spring Vale Cemetery Association was organized, and a 150 acre tract two miles northeast of the city in the Longlois Reserve was purchased. It was laid out into 35 sections, in the rural cemetery style. Hear all about ghosts, murders, accidental deaths, and more. This walking tour is self guided, and a map will be provided. Docents will be stationed around the cemetery to talk about various burials.
