The bright red neon rocking chair began advertising Reifers Furniture at 9th and Main Streets in 1914. Local legend says it was the first moving neon sign in Indiana! It topped a three-story tall sign for the furniture store until the location closed in 1981. The sign was then put in storage. Sixteen years later, Dick Mansfield became sole owner of Reifers Furniture and relocated the sign to the store's new location on North 36th Street. It continued to rock until the store was closed for good after Mansfield's death in 2003.

Donated in 2004 by the Richard and Jayne Mansfield family, TCHA worked with Huston Electric in 2010 to repair the broken neon wiring so that one side of the sign would light up again. A base was custom built for it by Stephan Schanke and it was placed in the second-floor window of TCHA's Frank C. Arganbright Genealogy Center. You might have seen it shining brightly a time or two as you passed us on South Street.

When it was discovered that one of the neon bulbs was broken, the TCHA Community was quick to act. Thanks to your generous giving, the chair is once again shining brightly after dark each night.

VOLUNTEER OF THE YEAR, CAROLYN O'CONNELL

Each year, a volunteer of the year is selected by TCHA staff, to be awarded at the the TCHA Annual Meeting. Our dear friend Carolyn O'Connell was not able to join us for the meeting, and so was presented with her award during one of her weekly volunteer sessions at the Arganbright!

A volunteer since 2013, Carolyn has always gone above and beyond expectations when supporting TCHA. In the past year, she offered her family's barn as a temporary storage site when our "History on Tour" trailer needed repairs. She always works on the landscaping at the Arganbright Center – helping other volunteers plant flowers, sweep sidewalks and trim bushes. She has made it her personal mission to kill all of the weeds at the Arganbright.

Carolyn is in regularly to work on library or collection indexes which help researchers find materials. This year, she finished an index of the Journal and Courier portrait collection, helped sort and file new articles to the library's vertical files, typed an index of the 1868 county map, finished transcribing the first couple of mortgage books, and assorted other short projects for the library. She always volunteers to run errands, like taking the recycling materials to the drop-off station and has helped the Feast by delivering tickets and pizza. She is also always ready to volunteer to help out with anything- like painting office spaces or tracking down someone to mow the lawn.

To top it off, she volunteers on the Collections Committee and helps to make important decisions regarding the Association's permanent collection.

HONORING OUR VOLUNTEERS AND MEMBERS

BALL-SHOLTY AWARD, LESLIE MARTIN CONWELL

The Evelyn Ball/William Sholty Award was established in 2006 by the Board of Governors. This award was created and initially given in memory and recognition of Mrs. Evelyn Ball and Dr. William Sholty for their significant contributions to the Tippecanoe County Historical Association. The annual honoree is selected by the governors and announced at the annual meeting.

The award is presented to individuals who enriched TCHA and who are instrumental in the preservation of Tippecanoe County history. The names of the recipients are engraved on a plaque that is displayed in the Alameda McCollough Research Library. This year's winner was Leslie Martin Conwell.

Leslie has been involved with Tippecanoe County Historical Association for most of her life. She has served the organization and the community by being the Feast of the Hunters' Moon Event Manager for 15 years. Leslie working with the performers, vendors, and volunteers made the Feast come alive.

In addition, Leslie became Operations Manager and Program Director of Tippecanoe County Historical Association in 2020 and then Executive Director in 2022. She was instrumental in steering the Association through the pandemic leaving the Association stronger and more agile by the time she resigned as Executive Director at the end of 2022.

Leslie has also been dedicated to preserving Tippecanoe County history though her time spent as Executive Director of The Farm at Prophetstown from 2015 to 2019. She has been involved in preserving history at the National level with her affiliation with the National Muzzle Loading Rifle Association.

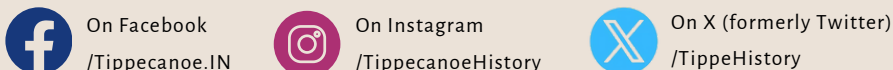

FOOD BOOTH QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

WHY HAVE A FOOD BOOTH AT THE FEAST OF THE HUNTERS' MOON?

If your organization needs a means by which to raise money for your organization's activities, participating as a Food Booth at The Feast of the Hunters' Moon is a way to raise money and increase the public profile of your organization. It can also be a great team building experience for participants.

WHO CAN HAVE A FOOD BOOTH?

The Feast of the Hunters' Moon provides opportunities for organizations such as scout troops, church groups, social or community service clubs, and other not-for-profit organizations to raise money by operating a Food Booth at the Feast. TCHA currently shares profits from the Feast of the Hunters' Moon with approximately 50 community organizations who participate in a variety of capacities.

WHAT IS A FOOD BOOTH?

A food booth run by an area organization prepares food on site and then sells these items to visitors at the annual Feast of the Hunters' Moon. The Feast regularly hosts over 40,000 attendees during its two day run. The Feast committee works with organizations to find foods that match with the size of their volunteer base. Profits and expenses from food sales are shared between your organization and TCHA. Checks are usually issued to all food booths between 60 and 90 days after the event. TCHA pays for all the costs of hosting the event, entertainment, advertising, and attracting the attendees.

WHEN DOES A FOOD BOOTH NEED TO GET INVOLVED?

There is an organizational meeting for food booths on April 24, 2024 (but organizations may apply after that date). The 57th Feast of the Hunters' Moon will be held October 5-6, 2024.

WHERE IS THE FEAST OF THE HUNTERS' MOON HELD?

The event is held annually at Fort Ouïatenon Park, 3129 South River Rd, West Lafayette.

HOW MUCH CAN A GROUP MAKE RUNNING A FOOD BOOTH?

Since the Feast is an outdoor event, attendance and sales can be weather dependent. In a regular year, a food vendor can earn around \$2,000 or higher, depending on the size of their operation and their food selection. A large food vendor can earn \$15,000 or more during the Feast weekend.

HOW CAN I GET MORE INFORMATION?

- Interested organizations can contact the Feast coordinator, Brooke Sauter via email at feast@tippecanoehistory.org or at 765-426-2128.
- The Feast committee will work with you to identify appropriate food items and walk you through the ordering process with our food suppliers to avoid any up-front costs to your organization.
- We will also help you with determining an appropriate setup for your sales area and optional items such as primitive shelters, tables, chairs.
- All volunteers must be in historical dress appropriate to the Feast. TCHA has many suggestions for economical ways to properly outfit your crew.

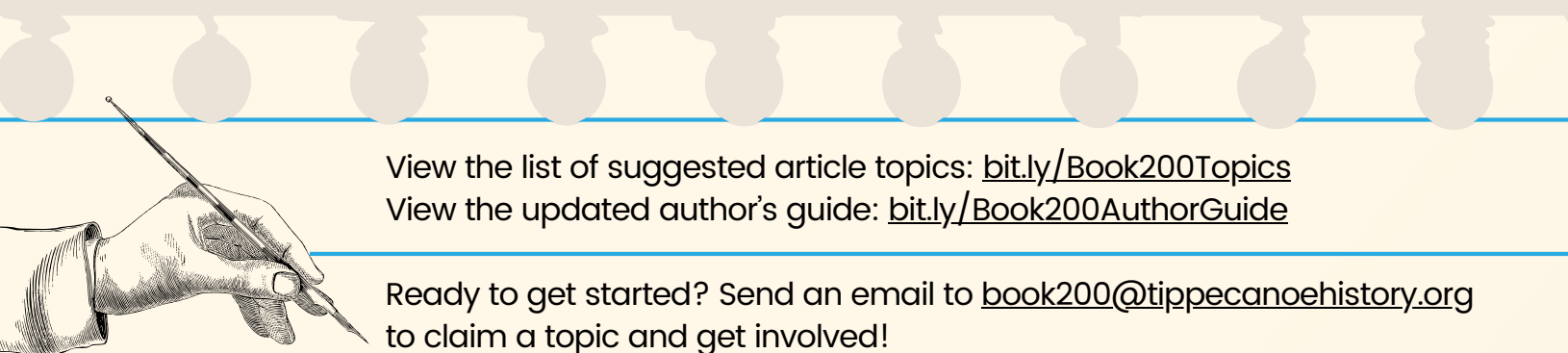

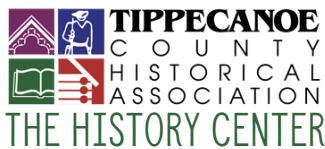
